10-STEP FIRE SAFETY PLAN

1. **Have a plan!** Establish a family meeting place a safe distance outside your home for everyone to gather in the event of a fire.
2. **Identify two exits.** Designate two exits from every room in your home – a door and a window.
3. **Install smoke alarms.** Install working smoke alarms in or near every sleeping area and on every level in your home.
4. **Maintain a quick exit route.** Keep furniture and clutter away from exit routes.
5. **Test smoke alarms at least once every year.** Sound smoke alarms when household members are awake so everyone knows what they sound like.
6. **Know the number.** Make sure everyone in your household knows how to call 911.
7. **Give yourself an easy out.** In the event of fire, choose the closest, safest exit route to get out quickly and stay out.
8. **Stay low and go!** To escape from a burning home, crawl out quickly on your hands and knees to help avoid smoke and fumes.
9. **Once you're out, stay out.** NEVER go back into a burning building.
10. **Practice makes perfect.** Practice your home fire escape plan with everyone in your home at least twice a year.
